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Representative Nathan Carlow Co-Signs Bipartisan Letter Urging Public Utilities Commission to Reinstate Moratorium on Utility Disconnections

STATE HOUSE/REMOTEY — **Representative Nathan Carlow** (R-Buxton), a member of the Joint Standing Committee on Energy, Utilities, and Technology, co-signed a letter drafted by Senator Joseph Baldacci (D-Penobscot) requesting that the Maine Public Utilities Commission reinstate the moratorium on utility disconnections that was in effect from March to November of last year.

“With the remainder of Winter still ahead of us, it is crucial that the Commission reinstate the moratorium put in place earlier in the pandemic without delay,” **Rep. Carlow** said in a statement. “Many Mainers remain unemployed due to the far-reaching effects of the COVID-19 virus, and in these circumstances, no person who can’t afford these services should lose access to them.”

The letter further requests that the moratorium be in place for at least 120 days, and also encourages the Commission to halt disconnection notices.

Dear Chairman Bartlett and Honorable Commissioners of the Maine Public Utilities Commission,

As you know, a global public health emergency that began early this year is becoming even more deadly and catastrophic as we enter another winter.

Back in March the Public Utilities Commission had the good sense to enact a moratorium on electrical disconnections for both residential and commercial customers. Your order dated March 16, 2020 stated that “all electric transmission and distribution utilities, natural gas utilities, water utilities and telephone providers of last resort (POLR) service not engage in any disconnection activity until further notice. This includes the issuance of disconnection notices and actual service disconnections for all classes of customers.”

With urgency and respect we, as elected representatives of the people of Maine, request that the same moratorium be reinstated, effective immediately, and remain in place for a minimum of 120 days.

The number of jobless Mainers has dramatically increased this year as have the number of small businesses forced to shut down. In the last two months the infection rate for the Coronavirus has risen dramatically, increasing hospitalizations and deaths and increasing public calls for citizens to stay home or otherwise restrict their employment or travel. It is fair to say the dire economic and public health circumstances we face today are significantly worse than the situation we faced in March of this year.

As leaders and policymakers whose only duty is to the public interest it is incumbent upon your good offices to reinstate the same broad based moratorium the PUC imposed in March and to keep it in place for a minimum of 120 days.

Hope is on the way with increased vaccines and some federal economic help- but hope is not enough for families and businesses to survive safely, over the next few harsh winter months.

I look forward to your well considered response. I will continue to speak out and urge my colleagues in the House and Senate to do the same to make sure our constituents, the rate payers, are put first when it comes to our Public Utilities Commission.

PS: If funding from the CARES Act or other considerations make a total moratorium impossible, and you do not intend to allow shutoffs of residential and small business customers, we would at least request that you bar utilities from issuing disconnection notices to such customers. Whether empty threats or real ones, these persistent calls, emails, visits and mailings are causing undue stress and hardship to many Maine residents who are already more than hard pressed. **And** increase the 30 day notice period to customers to 120 days as another alternative to consider.

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
